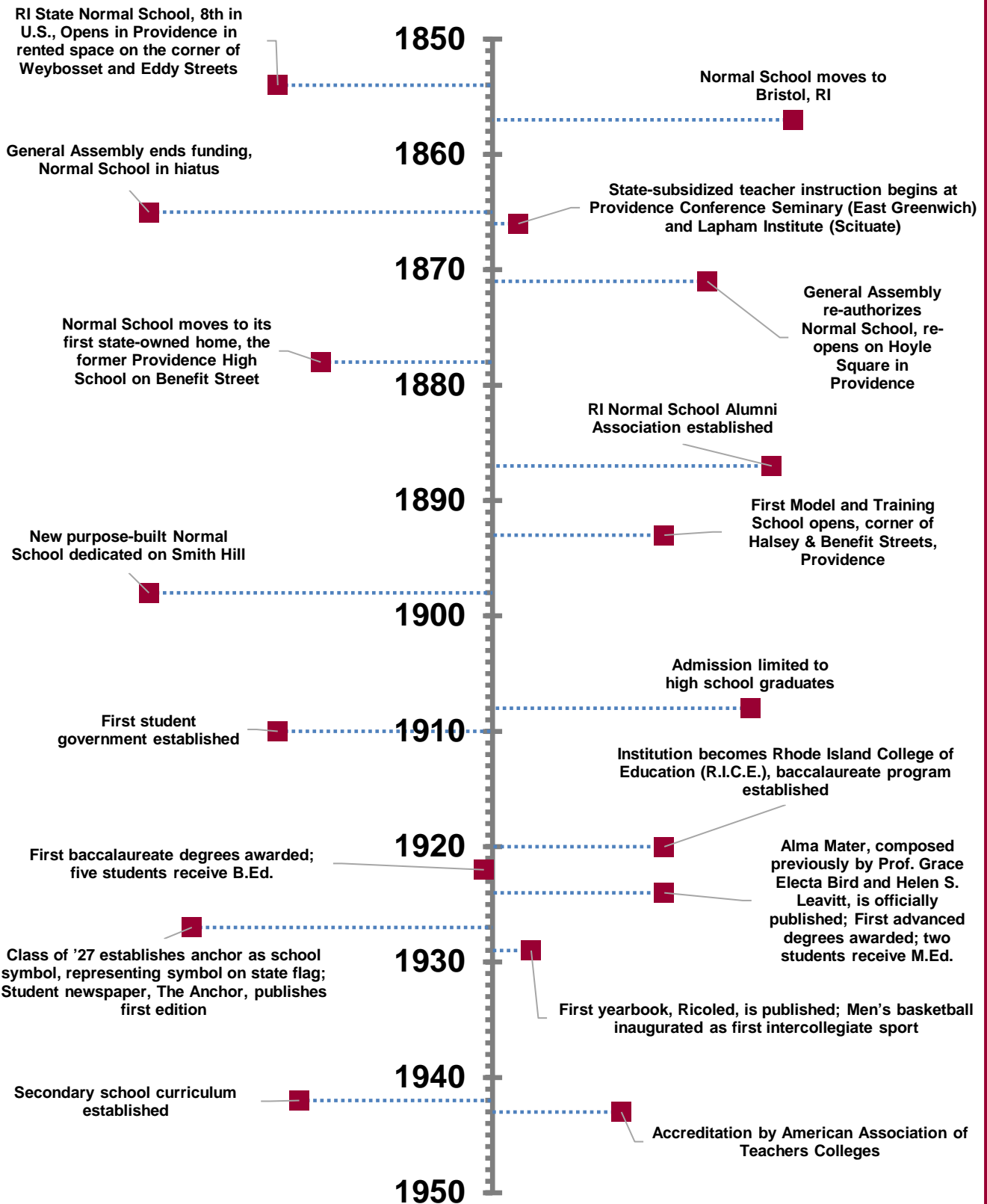

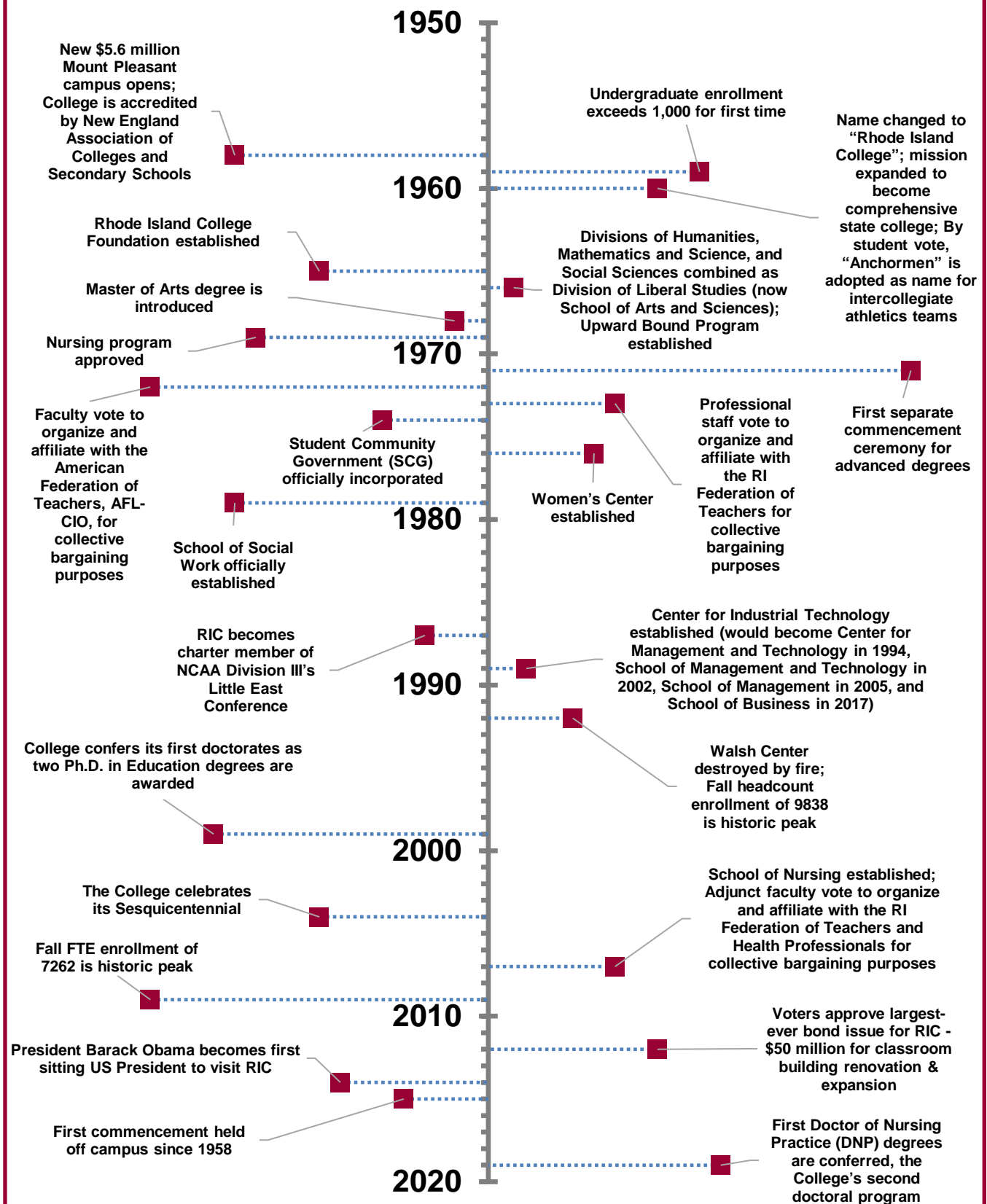

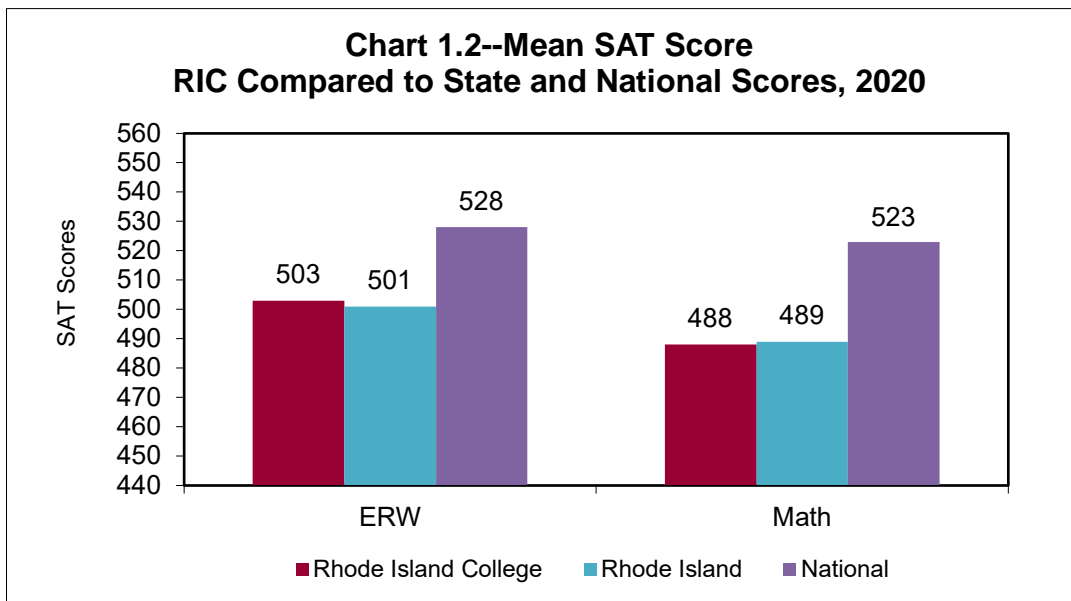

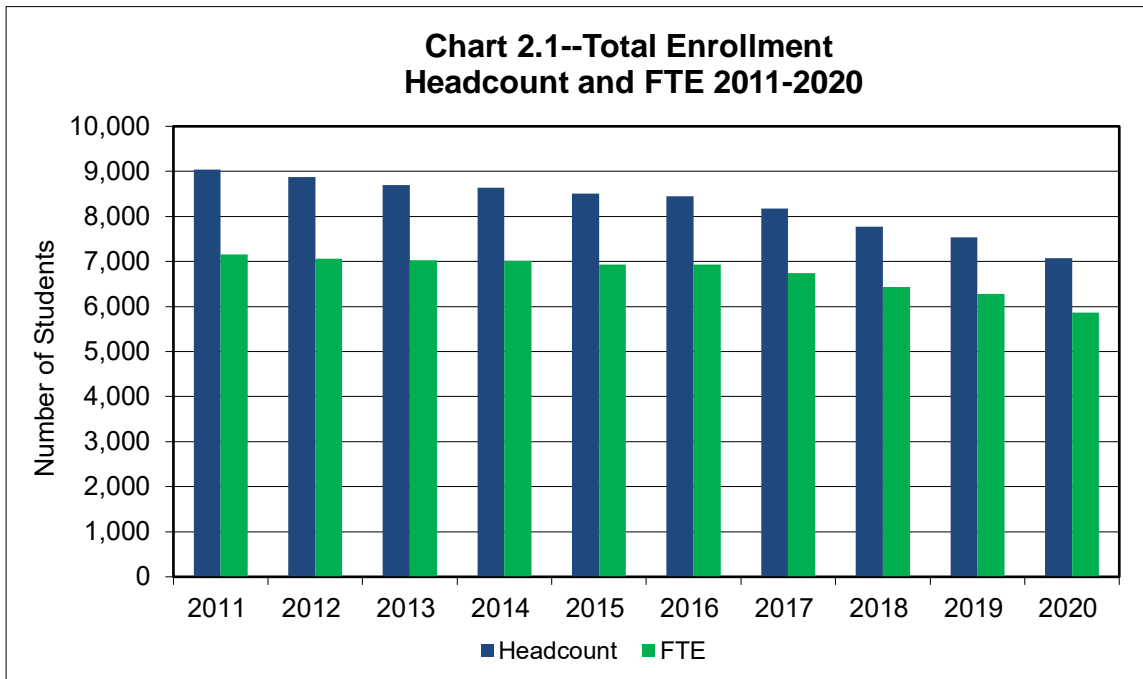

Fall 2011-Fall 2020**

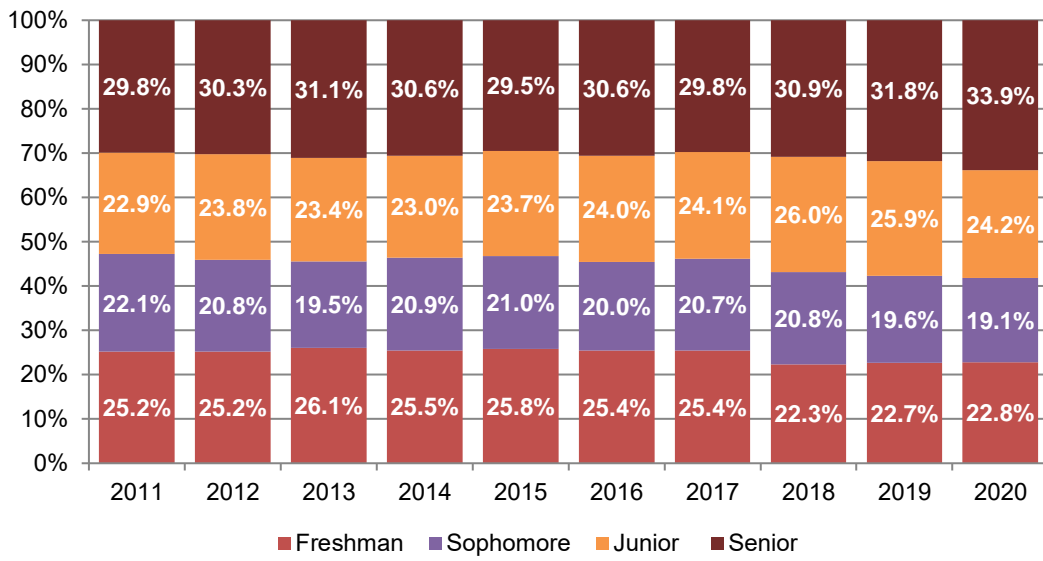

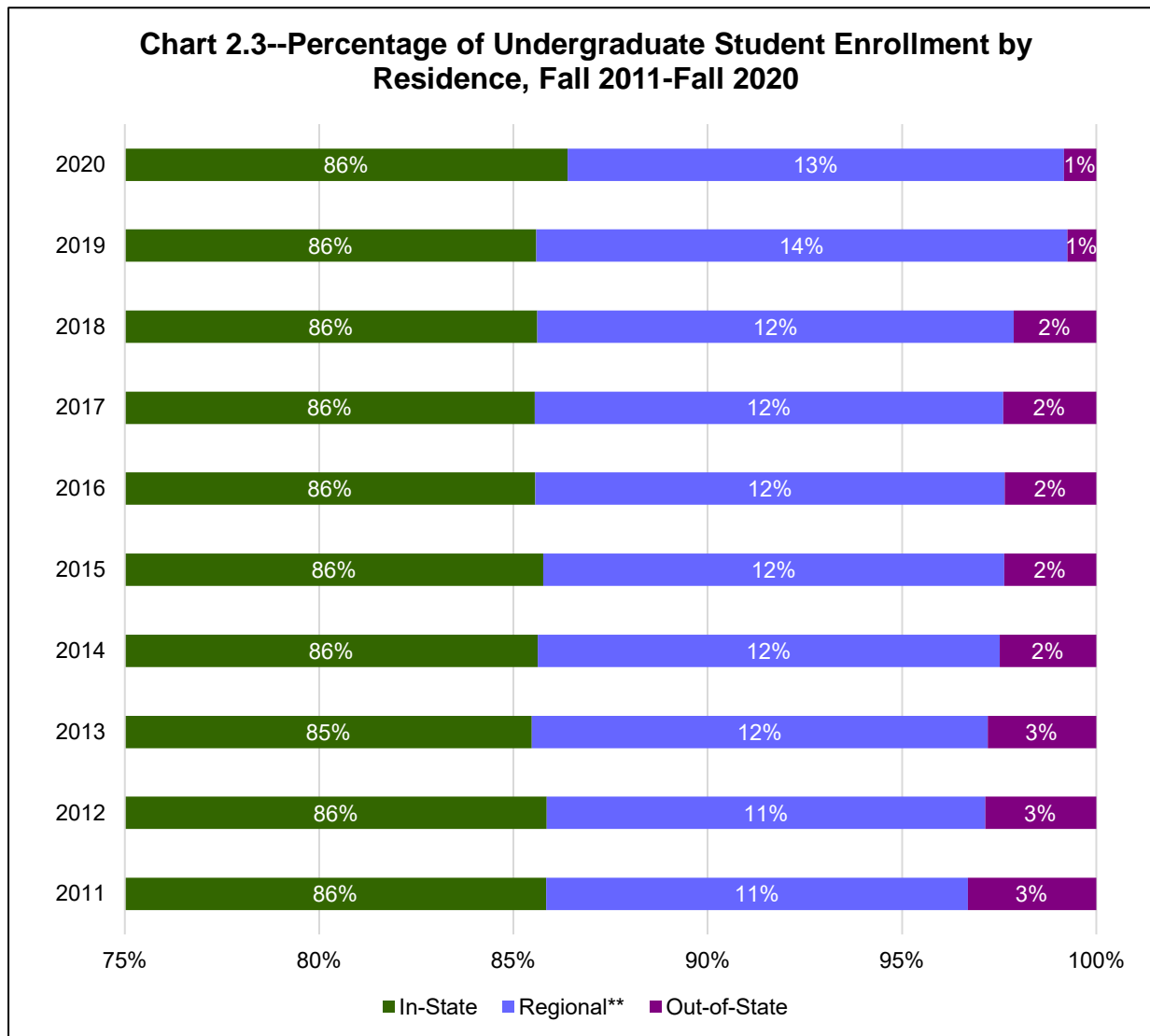

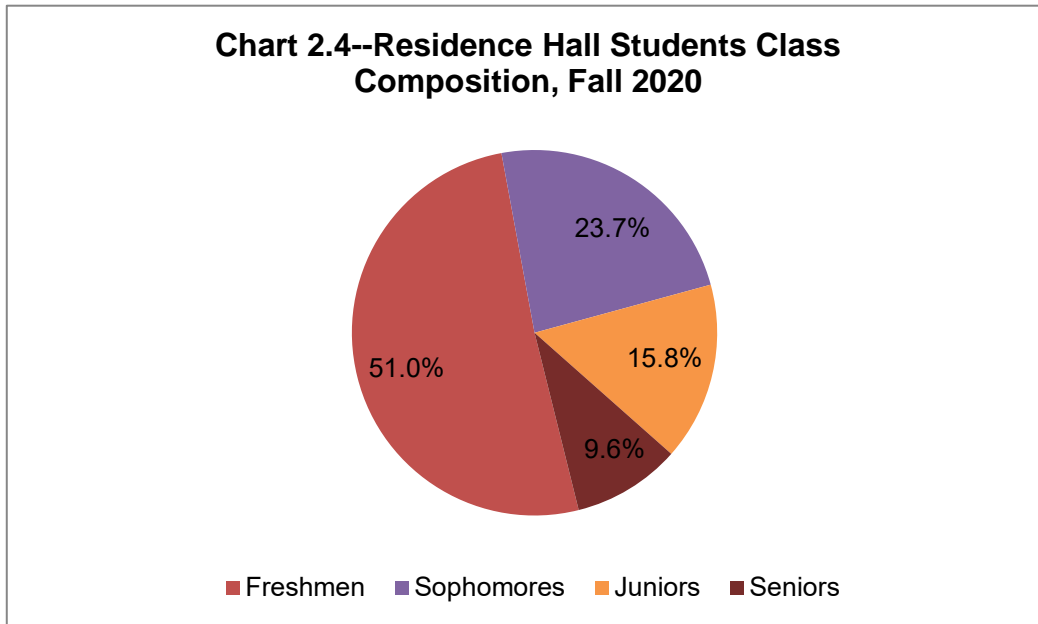

Chart 2.5-Undergraduate Students by Age, 2011-2020

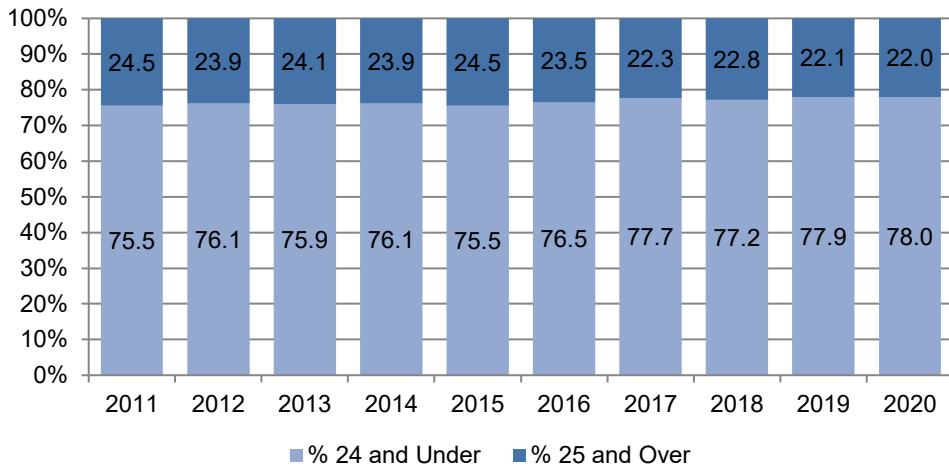


Chart 2.6-Graduate Students by Age, 2011-2020

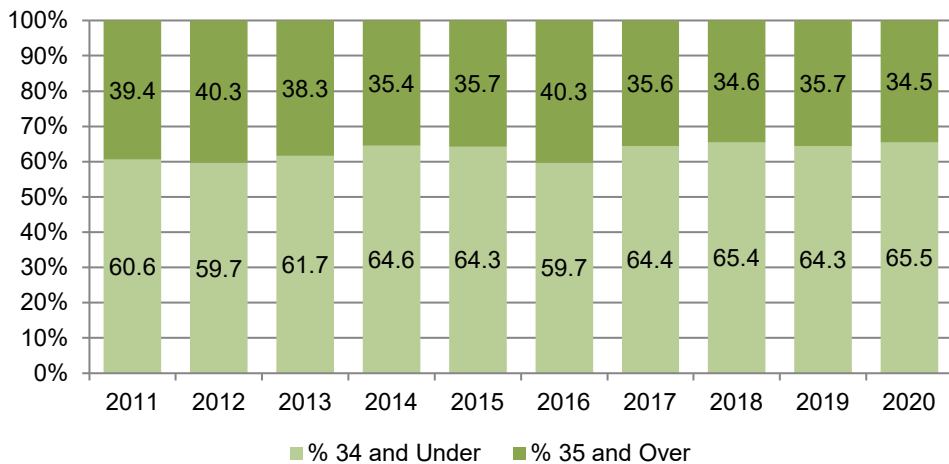

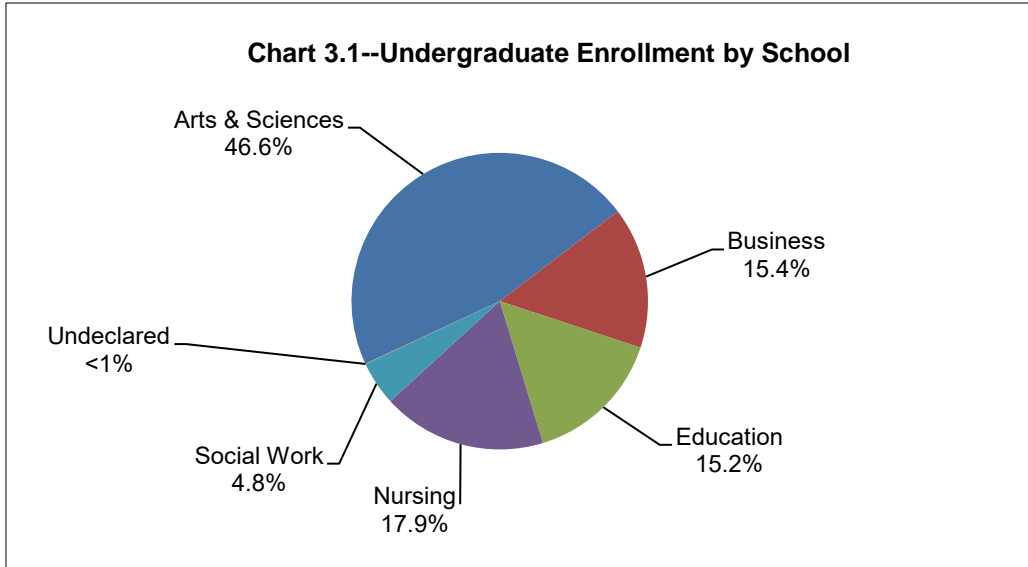

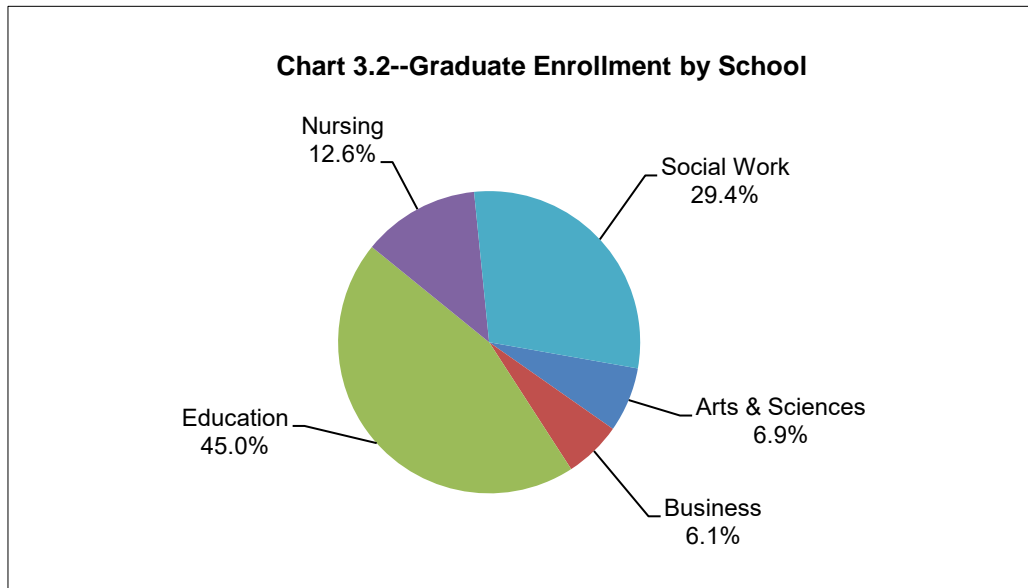

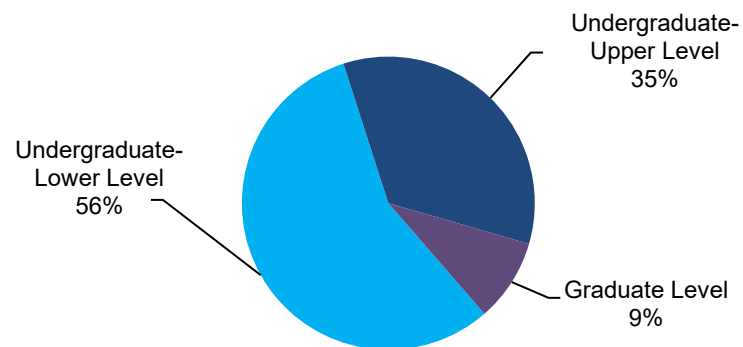

Fall 2010-2019 Cohorts**

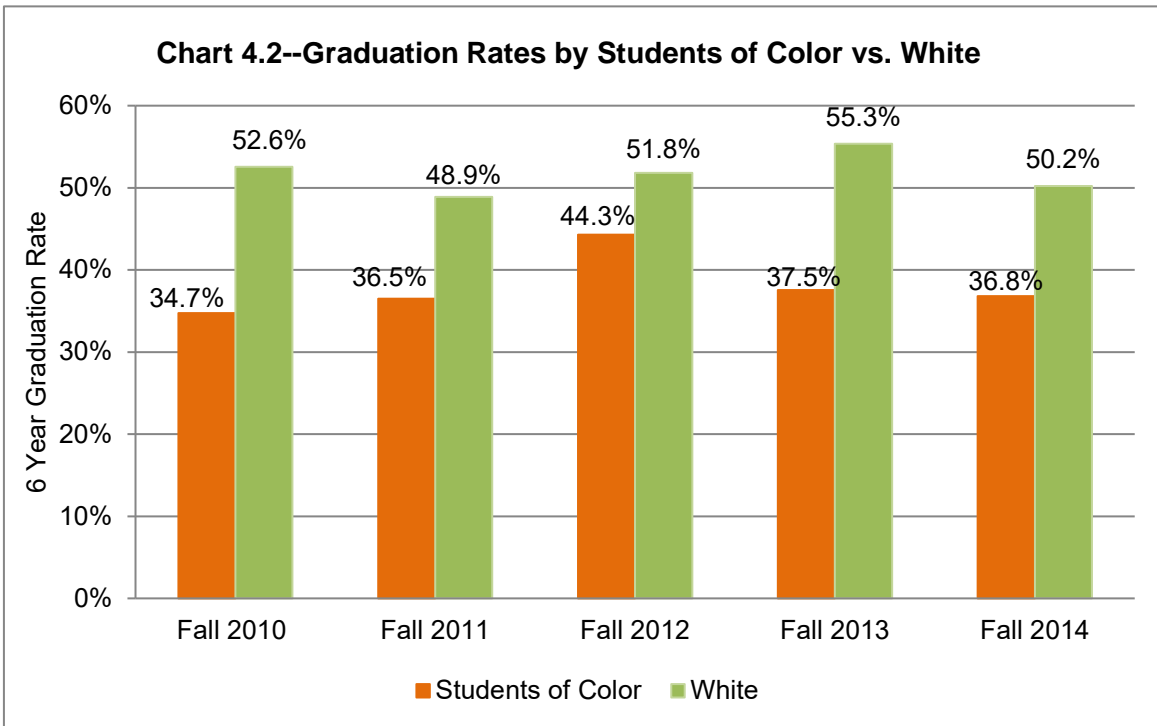
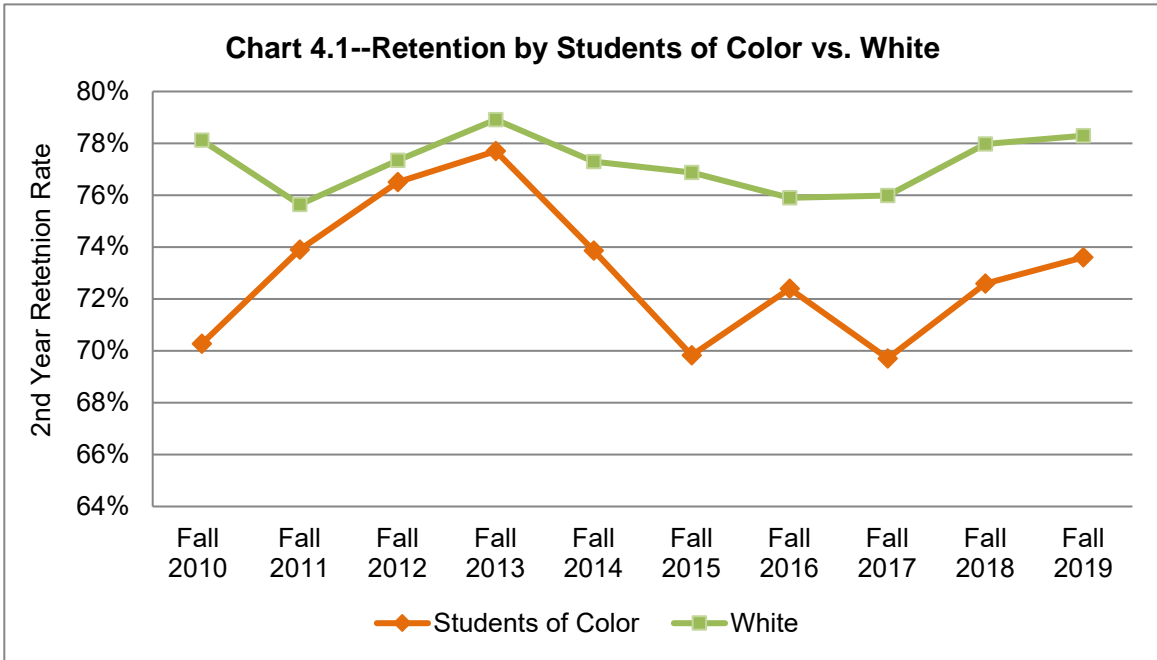

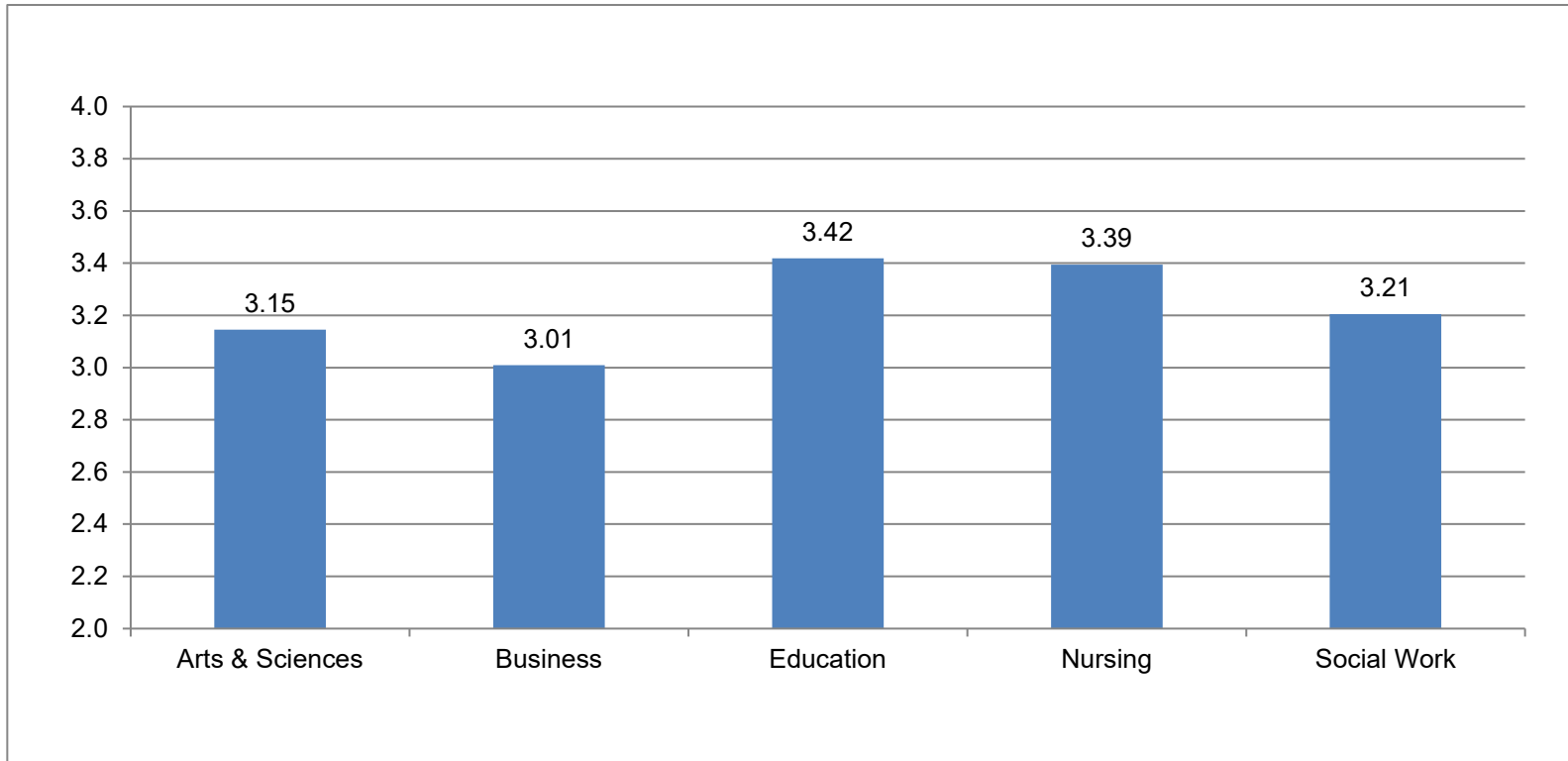

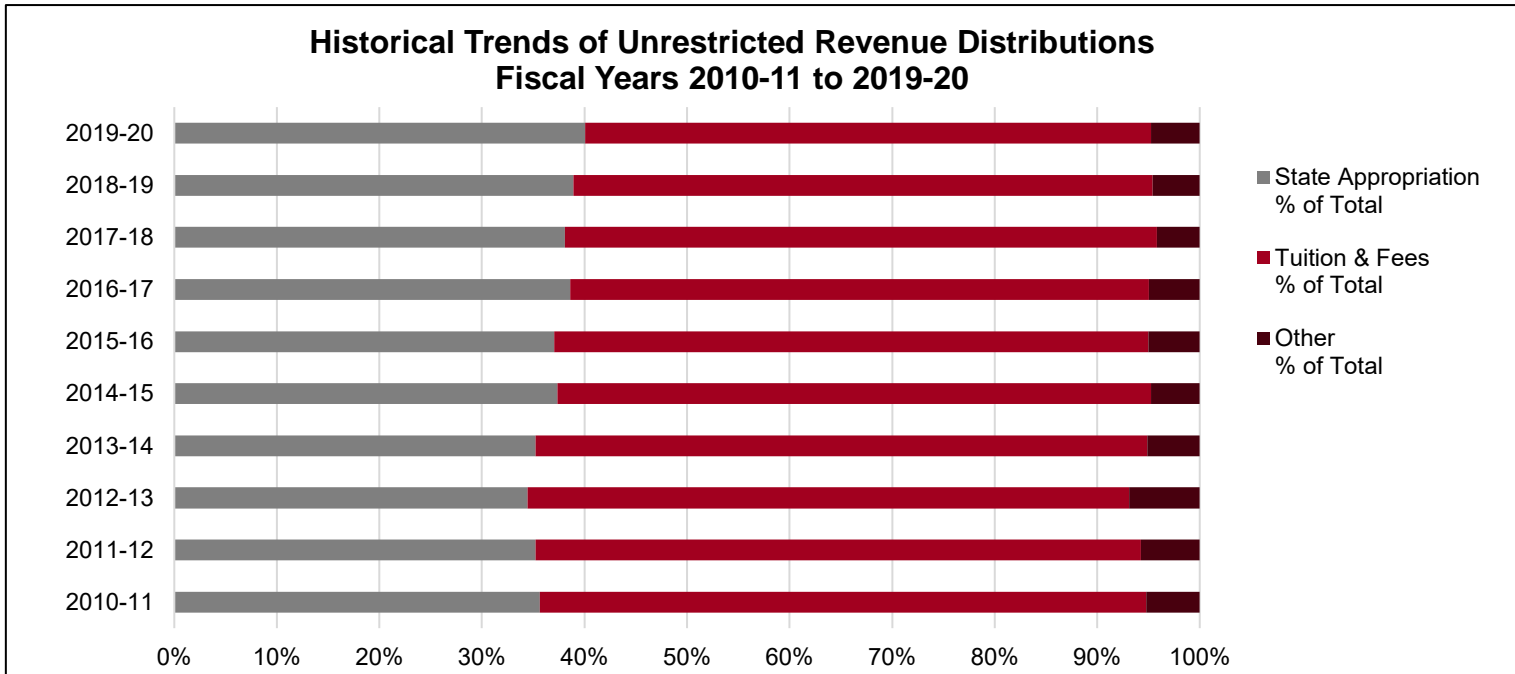
