Academic Rhode Map for Exploring Arts at Rhode Island College

This map is a semester-by-semester guide toward choosing a major, to be used alongside your appointments with your academic advisor. It is designed primarily for freshmen coming to college for the first time who are still exploring their academic options.

As soon as you decide on a major, you need no longer follow this Map.

Contact the chair/director of your chosen department/program to declare the major and schedule an advising appointment. You will then be assigned a faculty advisor within that department/program.

This map is not your only route; it is a suggestion.

The column to the left suggests the ideal courses for each semester, which are designed to help you to graduate in four years. This depends on how many courses you can take, how you perform in those courses, and what workload you feel you can handle. Sometimes those courses may be full or unavailable during the semester you plan to take them, in which case consider switching with another course from a different semester.
